## 1st XI REPORT

Although we were finalists in 1979-80, success can only be based on realization of potential and it was on this point that we let ourselves down badly.

We were better than our finals effort indicated. Probably the biggest disappointment was our failure to prove beyond all doubt that our first XI should never have been in C Grade to begin with. The season was a tale of too many ordinary performances among too few outstanding ones.

There is no doubt more younger players are needed to place pressure on the "regular" senior players and thus inject new life into our top eleven.

Of individual performances, Ian Wilton, Warren Meredith and Alan Johanson stood out with consistent batting performances, while Alan, John Hirth and Bryan McDonald were valuable bowlers. Many batsmen contributed at times, but not nearly often enough and not when it was most needed. The lack of mental discipline was a poor feature of our game.

Our fielding was good and at times brilliant, but once again pressure too often found us out.

That premiership will still elude us if we continue to become overawed by our opposition and fail to perform under pressure as was the case last season.

The side was often unbalanced, but many times players lifted their own game and made up for any shortcomings in the team. Throughout the season, the onfield behaviour of all players was excellent and the spirit and manner in which the games were played was a credit to the club.



# THE \$ DILEMMA

It seems the topic of payments to coaches and players is one which is under discussion more and more often

these days.

Whether it be a football, cricket or soccer club concerned, there is a school which believes that payments to players will solve all problems. Once the 'necessary cash has been raised, there is no doubt that in many cases the paying of players to represent your club will bring success on the field — but at what price?

It is to be expected that top-class sportsmen and sportswomen are well paid when they reach the top in their sport. However, when I hear people advocating the introduction of payments to players at our level, I am baffled at their logic. Thankfully, I haven't heard many people at Carnegie South supporting the idea, but there seem to be quite a few ambitious administrators around who do. Apart from such a thing being against CMCA rules (which are almost impossible to police anyway) I fail to see how it could mean anything but disaster for a club the size of ours.

Firstly, where does all this money come from? Our own small social committee work hard for twelve months of the year and do a wonderful job — and we can't afford to pay a coach. On the point of payment to a coach, I don't believe this is necessary either. Every year there are 11 senior premierships won in the CMCA and I'm sure very few of the teams that win those flags are led by paid coaches. Let's face it — we're playing amateur sport. In my opinion, if you're not good enough to

play professional sport, you're not good enough to be paid by a group of hard-working amateur officials and members who give up much of their time for their club.

Certainly, it would be lovely if we were all paid for playing cricket one day a week, but that is a dream! I've seen what money can do to football clubs. A leading suburban football club won the 1979 premiership after a huge spending spree. This year, they don't exist! It is rumoured they were \$10,000 "in the red", and of course they have no junior teams — all their energy and finances was directed at winning a senior flag. They got their premiership, but what good was that when it spelt the death knoll of their club? This particular club had a long history, but "money" killed it.

And what of the players who are replaced by the "paid imports"? Where do they go?

I am all for incentives from sponsorship and believe this is the only way in which to provide rewards for good performances by players.

I am convinced there is no room in our Saturday afternoon game of cricket for money. I hope our own committees will continue to work tirelessly to raise money for the continual re-equipping of our teams and improvement of facilities and conditions for our members.

The proposers of the "pay-to-play" scheme may have grandiose ideas, but those ideas are as impractical as they are fanciful.

#### A JUNIOR'S PLEA

Coach Ron Fauvel didn't have too much trouble with discipline in the first few games of the 1979-80 season. But, later on, some of the boys did make things a bit difficult. Ron and the junior selectors, after several warnings, dropped the boys who couldn't follow simple rules of behaviour.

#### MARK MEREDITH (57)

At long last, in 1979-80, Mark ended up where he should have been all along — as a regular 1st XI player! Mark was named as 2nd XI Vice-captain at the beginning of the season but his form was so consistently good, the club could not afford to leave him there any longer. Mark is a natural all-rounder whose batting has matured considerably over the past two seasons. Mark also handled our Indoor team most capably this season and the best is still yet to come from the "Ian Botham of Lord Park".

#### **JOHN EARLE (56)**

John has packed a great deal into his 56 games both on and off the field. After playing in the 1975-76 C-Grade Grand Final (which he nearly saved for us), John successfully captained the 2nd XI for three years, leading them to their first ever Grand Final in 1978-79. He won the 2nd XI Batting Averages in 1976-77 and 1977-78 and holds that team's record highest score of 123 n.o., scored in the 1978-79 semi-final.
